DESCRIPTION:

Memoirs of members of the Koshko family, specifically Ivan Frantsevich (-); his brother Arkadii (1867-1929); his son Boris (189?-1930); and his daughter Ol'ga (1891-). Almost all of the memoirs are in the hand of Ol'ga Koshko.

Ivan Koshko was appointed governor of Penza in 1907 and of Perm' in 1911; his memoirs (partly published) touch on his government service in Samara, Novgorod, Penza, and Perm', and his experiences during the 1917 Revolution and Civil War. Arkadii Koshko was a famous detective, author of Ocherki ugolovnogo mira Tsarskoi Rossii; this excerpt from his memoirs concerns the Beilis ritual murder case. Boris Koshko's memoirs concern his experiences as an imperial and provisional government official during World War I. Ol'ga Koshko's memoirs deal with her father and with life in the emigration in Europe.
