BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH: DMITRII A. OBOLENSKII

Prince Dmitrii A. Obolenskii was born on 26 October 1822. In 1842 he graduated from the Imperial Law Academy, and began government service. In 1843-53 he served in the Ministry of Justice, briefly in Kazan' and Tula provinces, and then, in St. Petersburg, in the Civil Court Tribunal (palata grazhdanskogo suda).

In 1853-63 he served in the Naval Ministry, and played a major role in its reform. He served as director of the Commissary Department. In 1863-70 he was director of the Customs Department; in 1870-72, assistant to the Minister of State Properties. From then to his death (22 January 1881) he served on various commissions, and was a member of the Senate and the State Council.

Throughout his career, Obolenskii took on many special assignments and served on commissions. One particularly important assignment came in 1862-63, when he chaired two commissions to review legislation and regulations on book publishing. He received many official honors. In 1854 he became a State Councillor; in 1856, Actual State Councillor; in 1863, State Secretary; and 1880, Actual Privy Councillor.
