## **DESCRIPTION:**

Correspondence, manuscripts and documents of Georg F.C. Staal (i.e., Egor Egorovich Staal, 1822-1907), Russian diplomat. Cataloged correspondence consists of a few items by Aleksandr Gorchakov and Philippe, Comte de Paris. There are many letters to Staal from Marie, Duchess of Wurtemberg, and Olga, Queen of Wurtemberg. There is a long series of drafts of letters by Staal to N.K. Giers, another high ranking Russian diplomat. Manuscripts consist of diplomatic reports, chiefly on Greece, Bulgaria, Turkey, Egypt and Russia in the 1870's. Documents include items signed by Tsar Alexander II and King George I of Greece, and Staal's personal financial records.

#### GEORG F.C. STAAL: BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Born in Estland in 1822, Staal was educated by his mother, his tutor Monsieur Hippius, and swiss governesses up until the age of 15, whereupon he entered a school for nobility of Estland in Reval. At 18, Staal enrolled in the Moscow University where he studied law, while preparing to enter government service. After serving a period of time in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in St. Petersburg, Staal served in the Russian embassies in Greece, Turkey, and Roumania. In 1867 Staal married princess Sophie Gorchakov, who bore him one daughter (Agathoclée). From 1871 to 1883, Staal represented Russia in Stuttgart, after which he was transferred to Munich, and in 1884 became ambassador to London. Staal died in 1907 in Paris.  $\langle C \rangle$
