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in the same manuscript, and also in two other manuscripts, two of them (fol. 112v and fol. 113v) as parts of the same original codex. Additional notes on the surviving fragments of Aelfric's *Grammar* can now be added. Ker 389 (based as at Sigmaringen but now in The Library, Bloomington, Indiana) and Ker 242 (fols. 8 and 9, Harley 3915) were, I contend, once parts of the same codex and should, thus, be considered to have the same authority in future editions of the whole work.¹ Since a new edition is now in progress,² there is no need to present the two fragments here. Detailed palaeographical proof of their kinship is the aim of this present study.
